Character #14 The Devil

The Devil (from Greek: διάβολος or diábolos, 'the one who splits and separates') is, according to Christianity and Islam, the chief opponent of humankind. Christianity identifies the Devil (or **Satan** or **Lucifer**) with the **Serpent** who tricked Adam and Eve into eating the forbidden fruit, and describes him as a fallen angel who rebelled against God and has therefore been condemned to eternal fire at the Last Judgement. The Christian figure of Lucifer bears all the marks of the archetype of the upporting (overreacher), that is, a dark hero that, like Prometheus or Ulysses, challenges God's laws with a view to gaining **knowledge**. The most beautiful and heart-rendering words the Devil has ever spoken in literature are in **Paradise Lost** by John Milton (1674), where - upon seeing Adam and Eve making love in the Earthly Paradise – Lucifer experiences anguish and sorrow and makes the most tormented claim ever: 'I myself am Hell'. Being connected with social prohibitions and taboos, since the 16th century this figure has been increasinally associated with illicit sexuality - traces of this can be found in the devilish and morbidly sexual traits of vampires, which are closely related to the devil. Also, the Devil represents the guilty feelings that accompany sexual desire in such poems as the famous **Skunk Hour** by American **Robert** Lowell (1957).
